Branch Libraries

June Recap

- ❖ Our June Memory Cafés were a big success! Hazard hosted their first café on June 18, where Kate Kisselstein led participants on a virtual tour of MacArthur Stadium and everyone sang "Take Me Out to the Ball Game". Betts hosted a café on July 27 where Aran West did a creative storytelling activity involving curious photos displayed on the projector. The group made up silly stories about what was going on in the photos and everyone laughed and had a great time. Both cafés prompted responses from attendees about what they loved about the programs − especially the singing and the chance to get creative.
- ❖ In June, many of our city branches took the opportunity of these warm and sunny Syracuse days to do outdoor programs that help patrons appreciate the beauty of our surroundings. At Petit, ESF student Levi O'Brien held a neighborhood tree walk, educating participants about the historical use of different kinds of trees and how to identify them. At Mundy, Onondaga Audubon did a special Urban Bird Walk during which participants learned how to identify common birds such as the barn swallow, chimney swift, grackle, spotted sandpiper, and mallard duck. Mundy also hosts weekly summer gardening programs in the pocket park across the street from the library. Many of their young patrons now tend to the garden on their own when the library is closed, and a group of teens were able to establish an area with watermelon, tomatoes, and basil.
- Summer Reading is off to a great start at all of our city libraries, but as always it took a lot of promotion by dedicated library staff to spread the word and get kids signed up. Speaking directly to children and inviting them into the library always has a big impact on Summer Reading participation, and we are proud of the work our library staff does to help prevent the Summer Learning Slide while having lots of fun. This year's efforts included:
 - Susan Cox at Paine Branch reached 885 students by visiting local schools such as Blessed Sacrament, Huntington, and Salem Hyde, and hosting in-library class visits
 - Quinn Gardner at Petit visited 20 groups of students at Ed Smith, and spoke to all kindergarten—7th grade classes as well as one small 8th grade class, reaching 575 people total
 - Soule's Miss Margaret did outreach visits to HW Smith as well as inviting groups of students into the library for story time field trips
 - Shauna Modrow at Hazard does classroom story times at All Saints Elementary all throughout the school year.
 - White Branch staff teamed up with the City of Syracuse to host a block party to kick off Summer Reading at the library. There were representatives from community organizations, food giveaways, outdoor lawn games, and a visit by Dan the Snake Man.

Coming UP

- Agine Branch is planning an upcoming cooking class as part of OCPL's Kitchen Literacy Grant. In early August, they will offer a class hosted by local chef Anju Gupta featuring Indian recipes including Mango Lassi, hot sandwiches, and Bhel Puri.
- ❖ The Ben Snow Foundation has decided to award a grant of \$5,000 to the American Heart Association which is partnering with White Branch to provide programs and services related to healthy eating. Brittany Taylor, Community Impact Director for the CNY region, applied for the grant with input from SOFSA and White Branch staff. White has recently started circulating blood pressure cuffs courtesy of the AHA, and the Ben Snow grant money will be used for programs on healthy eating, a community food fridge, and books and resources on cooking and healthy food choices.
- ❖ In July, we will be moving quickly to fill some critical branch and Central positions, including a full-time Librarian II for Children's Services at Betts, a full-time Clerk I at Soule, a full-time Floating Clerk, and part-time Clerk I positions at Central and Beauchamp.

- ❖ We were excited to be able to promote Nan Brown to Librarian II for KidSpace, beginning June 1.

 Nan has worked at Central as the Teen Librarian since 2022, and her experience and enthusiasm for youth services and programming is greatly appreciated as she begins her new role in KidSpace, helping to organize the staff, space, and calendar for a fun and exciting Summer Reading Program.
- ❖ On June 12, Central hosted a Global Kitchen program in collaboration with Jess Miller of the Kitchen Literacy Project. Ngoc from Mama Hai Restaurant led a cooking session during which 20 participants learned how to make Banh Mi sandwiches, got a cultural history lesson of the French Colonial Vietnamese context that gave rise to the Banh Mi, and got to try some delicious samples.
- ❖ On June 26-28, Nicole Broadnax from the City of Syracuse's API Team led a Game Development Summer Camp for Tweens in the MakerSpace. Participants were taught how to design and develop their own playable platform video game using the free Microsoft MakeCode Arcade website, and on the last day they finished up their projects and celebrated with snacks.

❖ We wrapped up the Redhouse season, and they are interested in having the pop-up for their next season, as well as one for the summer. I am currently working on getting books, and Tom will take them over and set up the display. Summer themes will include *Alice in Wonderland*, *Shrek the Musical*, and books about creating musical performances to support youth summer camps with the theater team.
